Prior research published by SFNA would suggest the following corrections regarding the content in the first column of page six bearing the heading:
"MEET THE "STUDENBECKERS"

~~"In June of 1736, the Dutch ship *Harle* left Frefeld, Germany destined for Philadelphia. "Foreigners...from the ship *Harle*, of London, Ralph Harle, Master, from Rotterdam, but last from Cowes, [England]..." disembarked at Philadelphia 1 September 1736.* Among its 388 passengers were Peter, Clement [or Clemens] and Henry [or Heinrich] Studenbecker [Stot(t)enbecker]. The family were sword makers in the old country, and the family line can be [has been] traced back to the 14th [16th] Century.~~

In the new world 'Studenbecker' [eventually] became Studebaker and the [Clement] family settled in [near] a religious community in Ephrata, Pennsylvania. Peter [Both Clement] Studebaker and Peter [Clement] Studebaker, Jr., ~~soon opened a blacksmith shop~~ [are thought to have engaged in blacksmithing] near York, Pennsylvania.

Peter [Clement] Studebaker Jr.'s son John Clement ~~opened~~ [established] a blacksmith shop ~~of his own~~ [adjacent to his home] in the Gettysburg area village of Pinetown, Pennsylvania."
